



# Song, Dance, Laughter

Get ready to get your arts fix as the 12th edition of Festival Napa Valley gears up to hit stages big and small throughout Wine Country this month.

Perhaps it's because Bill Murray captivated us so with his goofy sardonic wit on Saturday Night Live and followed it up with loveable, zany performances in Caddyshack and Ghostbusters (legions of college kids still recite his classic—many of them ad-libbed—one-liners daily) that part of our collective consciousness longs to keep him in those roles. But comedy is just one of Murray's many talents. He is a versatile performer and gifted actor making the audience appreciate everything from his angst and ennui in Lost in Translation to pain and sorrow in Olive Kittredge.

When he's not on screen, you'll find Murray on the golf course; at the baseball field (he is a partial owner of four minor league teams, including the St. Paul Saints, Charleston River Dogs, Hudson Valley Renegades, Brockton Rox), or singing. He's much more than a crooner; he loves classical music as well as great American literature and poetry.


Thanks to a fateful meeting with cellist Jan Vogler on a plane from Berlin to New York in 2013, ticket holders for this year's Festival Napa Valley will enjoy Murray combing that passion for music and words at the U.S. premier of *New Worlds*. Of this exciting venture, Murray told *The New York Times* recently, "When they (Vogler, violinist Mira Wang, and pianist Vanessa Perez) start playing, the demand is so great that if you are attend-

ing to who you are right now, it brings out something that you couldn't have visualized or planned for." With the trio playing a combination of Bach, Schubert, and Piazolla, Murray will sing Stephen Foster's "Jeanie with the Light Brown Hair" and pieces from West Side Story as well as read passages from Hemingway and Whitman. Murray also noted in his Times interview that the idea for New Worlds is like a collision of America and Europe. "We are from four different continents, and when the continents come together, the music moves [and] it's just a short journey."

It promises to be an interesting and surprising performance. But as Murray's friend and director for *Lost in Translation* and the HBO special *A Very Murray Christmas* Sofia Coppola told *The New York Times*, "It's not surprising for Bill—he always keeps things interesting."

Always keeping things interesting might just be the mantra of Festival Napa Valley (FNV) itself. When FNV CEO Rick Walker co-founded the Festival 12 years ago, he knew that doing the same thing each year would never be acceptable. He'd need to assemble a team that would seek out performers on the rise, the best of the best. Walker recalls, "I'd been working with the Russian National Orchestra for a number of years, bringing them to the United States for several performances in California at

Montalvo, Stern Grove, and always one in Napa. As time wore on, it became clear that the Napa Valley not only craved a fine arts festival, but could support one as well." Early supporters Athena and Timothy Blackburn echo Walker's sentiment. "We listened to the pitch and immediately saw the potential," recalls Athena. "This area is so beautiful, and wine is the backbone. But when

you are here and part of the community, you need more than just wine tasting."

Longtime supporters of the Opera, Ballet, and Symphony in San Francisco, the Blackburns envisioned the crossover possibilities. Timothy, who now serves as the Chairman of the Festival notes, "We always say every year it will be hard to make the next one better, but somehow it happens. That's really thanks to the magic of the FNV staff and because the whole team has made the Festival so much fun-not just for the guests-but for the performers as well." Indeed, when performing at other festivals, artists leave right after they get off stage. At FNV, the artists' contracts require them not only to perform, but also to attend various luncheons and dinners at wineries throughout the week. With a smile,
